Just buy a ticket and jump on one of the trams that criss-cross around the city for a tour on your own. You can buy your ticket by tapping your bank card when entering the tram.

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Experience the neighbourhood

Things to do within walking distance from The America Cruise Terminal

The surroundings of the America Cruise Terminal have a lot to offer. Only a few hundred meters from The America Cruise Terminal, you will find the Maritime Museum and Aquarium where you can explore the sea with all your senses. It is a place filled with adventurous stories, fantastic objects and exhibitions for all ages. The new aquariums offer exciting underwater worlds with seaweed forests, fish and a living coral reef. (Closed on Mondays)

Just opposite the museum, you will find Moreno Pizzeria. An old cinema at the square Stigbergstorget has been transformed into what might just be the world's largest pizza place. You don't need a reservation, no matter how big your party is, worst case scenario is a short wait at the bar or perhaps up on the large roof top terrace. The roof top beer garden offers some amazing views of the neighbourhood Majorna and the river Göta älv.

Nearby, also within walking distance is a lovely area, Gathenhielska Culture Reserve, which is one of the oldest and best-preserved areas, located at Stigbergstorget nearby the cruise terminal. The area shows old buildings from the 16th and 17th centuries before the big fires. The reserve was created in 1936.

Explore Gothenburg's gems on land and then splash into the river with the amphibious bus sightseeing tour.

35 Let's boat on your own
Explore Gothenburg from the water and the canals that surround the city centre. Rent an electrical driven boat that takes up till 12 persons.

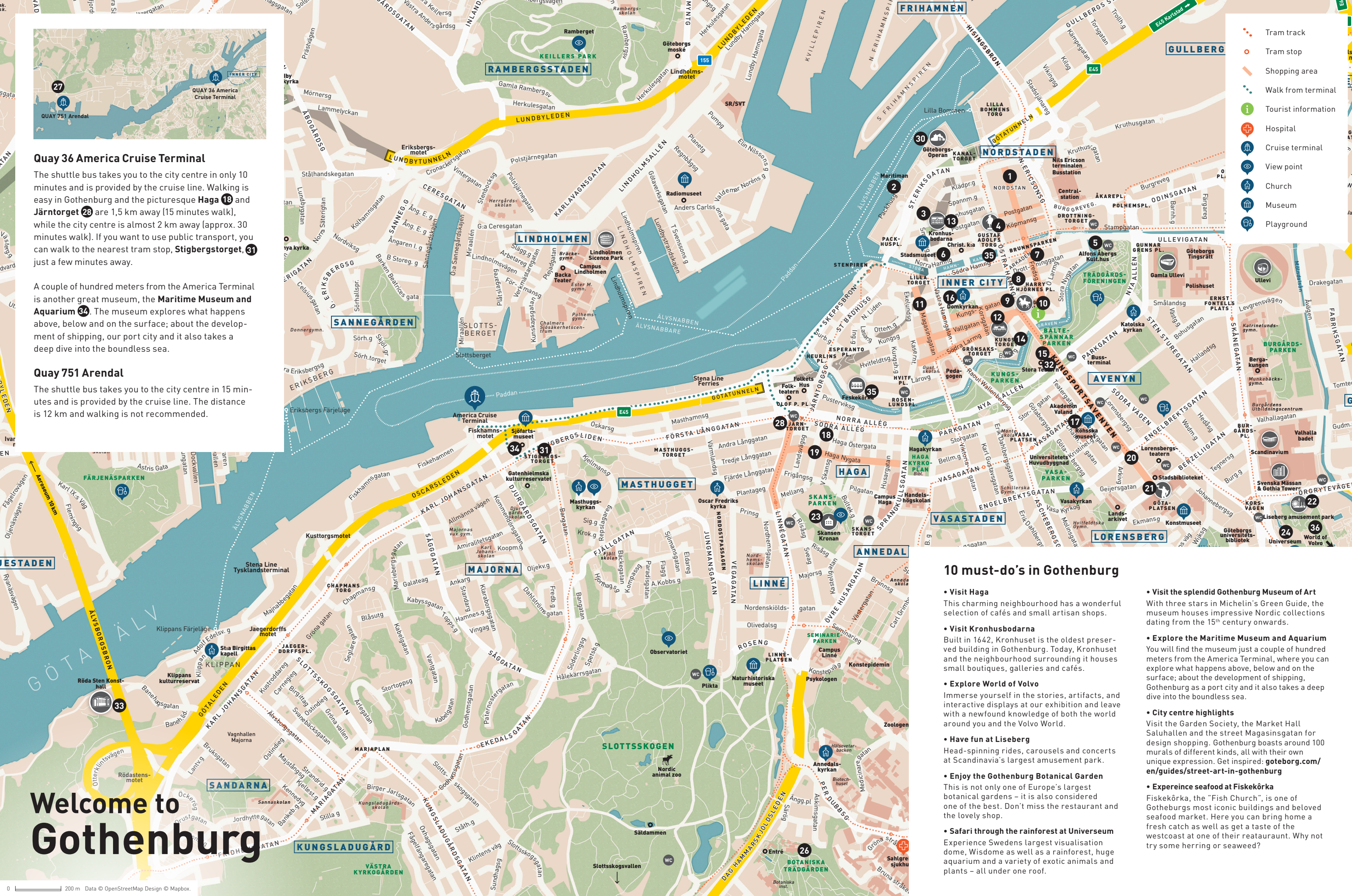
Kids?

And don't miss **Maritime Museum and Aquarium** 34.

3 things you should try when in Gothenburg

Fika
The word "fika" basically means having a coffee or tea with a snack - but you will be surprised by how serious the Swedes are about it. Visit any café and dive into a micro-cosmos of buns and cakes.

Craft beer
With approximately 30 micro-breweries, Gothenburg is the Swedish beer capital. Stigbergets, Poppels and Dugges are just some of the city's renowned breweries. Of course, non-alcoholic alternatives are available.

Herring
Pickled herring is very typically Swedish and the locals enjoy it at Christmas, midsummer, Easter - and quite frankly all year round. The same goes for meatballs.



THE CITY WALK

Enjoy the best of Gothenburg in two hours

Domkyrkan
The Gothenburg cathedral from 1633 is located in the heart of the city and is a majestic sight. **16**

Magasinsgatan
Have a "Swedish fika" or a bite to eat from a food truck. The city's trendiest district also offers great shopping. **11**

The Market Hall (Saluhallen)
Breathe in the aromas, sample the delicacies or tuck into an affordable lunch. **The Market Hall 12**, located on **Kungstorget**, has retained its old charm since 1888 and is a must for foodies.

Götaplatsen
Do like the sea god Poseidon and take in the view from the top of **Kungssportsavenyen 20**, the main boulevard (also called *Avenyn*). Here, you have the **Gothenburg Concert Hall**, the **Gothenburg City Theatre**, the **Gothenburg Museum of Art**, the **Contemporary Art Hall** and the **Hasselblad Center 21**.

Röhsska Museum
Explore historic and contemporary design and craft. Don't miss the surrounding city architecture. **17**

Haga
Stroll down this quaint pedestrian street and take a coffee break among the charming "Governor's houses" dating from late 19th century. You might even be tempted to try Gothenburg's biggest cinnamon bun! **18**

Skansen Kronan (next to Haga)
The fortress was brought into service in 1698, equipped with 23 cannons, but was never used in battle. Today the hill is a popular lookout point offering inviting views over the rooftops. **23**

The Fish Church
The Fish Church, Fiskekärka, is a beloved seafood market that gets its name from the buildings resembling to a church. Dive into a world of seafood and taste something new from under the sea. **35**

Kronhuset
Take a stroll to the oldest building in Gothenburg, dating back to the 17th century. Sense the history and take a look in the artisan studios that ring the cobble courtyard. **13**

World class shopping and local design

Interior design and fashion
Start your walk at **Kungssportsplatsen 10** and head down the streets of **Kungsgatan 9** and **Vallgatan 12**. The charming area within the moat is home to a mix of small specialist shops and large chain stores. Be sure to visit the area around the street **Magasinsgatan 11**, well-known for its inspiring interior design shops, fashion and great street food.

Small boutiques and sweet treats
Continue to **Haga 19**, an area home to numerous small, sustainable boutiques that offer a mix of old and new. Stroll along the main street *Haga Nygata* and browse among a wonderful assortment of antiques, handicrafts, designer goods, books, children's clothing and vintage fashion. Don't miss the traditional clog and leather shop *Haga Trätöffelfabrik*, enjoy a good cup of coffee at one of the cafés, or treat yourself to a massage or Swedish sauna at the beautiful *Hagabadet spa 18*.

Discover the main boulevard
The next stop is the main boulevard, **Kungssportsavenyen 20** (also called *Avenyn*), which stretches from **Götaplatsen 21** to the bridge **Kungssportsbron** by the moat. The boulevard is lined with cafés, restaurants and popular bars. In the summer, *Avenyn* becomes even livelier as the pavements fill up with great spots to enjoy a coffee or drink in the sun. If you enjoy shopping you can find just about everything you need, and more besides, on *Avenyn* and its side streets.

A quick fix with style
Need to find great shopping quickly? The Swedish department store **Nordiska Kompaniet 8** is always a good choice. This exclusive store offers fashion, accessories, beauty and interior design. And while you're in the area – pop over to **Fredsgatan 7**, a street lined with international fashion brands just a stone's throw away. Walk for a minute or two and you'll enter one of Sweden's most popular shopping centres with 200 shops under one roof, **Nordstan 1**.

THE HISTORY WALK

400 year old buildings and modernist gems

The birth of Gothenburg
Experience the history of Gothenburg with the history walk. In 1621, King Gustavus Adolphus founded Gothenburg. At the **square Gustaf Adolfs torg 4** you will find the statue of the king once widely known as *The Lion of the North*. Walk 350 metres to see one of Gothenburg's oldest buildings, **Kronhuset and Kronhusbodarna 3**, dating back to 1654. The whole area is teeming with history, and today you will find a number of artisan shops for glassworks, pottery and other crafts here.

Visit a golden era
On your way towards **Haga 19**, you will see a lot of impressive 18th century buildings, reminding us of a time of great wealth. In particular, you should have a look at the building that now houses the **Museum of Gothenburg 6** at *Norra Hamngatan 12*. Once, this was the majestic home of the *Swedish East India Company* that traded large amounts of goods with China. The canal, built in the 17th century, was constructed with help from Dutch experts.

Haga – a unique neighbourhood
Arriving in **Haga 19**, you will notice a big change in architecture. Here, the main pedestrian street is lined with beautiful wooden houses. Many of these were built in the late 19th century and are unique to Gothenburg. If your legs are still strong, climb the stairs to the late 17th century fortress **Skansen Kronan 23** to admire an amazing view of the city.

An architectural masterpiece
From Haga you should head towards **Götaplatsen 21** on the main boulevard **Kungssportsavenyen 20** (also called *Avenyn*). On the way you'll pass the design museum **Röhsska 17**, full of historic design. At **Götaplatsen** you will find the **Gothenburg Museum of Art**, the **Gothenburg Concert Hall**, the **Gothenburg City Theatre** and the centre for contemporary art **Göteborgs Konsthall**. Between the beautiful Concert Hall and the City Theatre, you will also find Carl Milles' impressive sculpture **Poseidon 21** watching over the city.

Five good things to know when in Gothenburg

Sightseeing for all tastes
It is easy to walk or bike anywhere. You can also rent a kayak or a boat and explore the canals on your own. If you want to explore the city on two wheels, the bicycle-sharing system has more than 1,000 bicycles.

An almost cash-free society
Swedes love to use their payment cards. Cash is uncommon, and some shops and restaurants don't even accept it. Therefore, we advise you to use your credit or debit card.

The home of Volvo
Gothenburg is the home of the Volvo car. In celebration of this heritage, the experience centre **World of Volvo** will open in 2024. Immerse yourself in the stories, artifacts, and interactive displays at the exhibition and leave with a newfound knowledge of both the world around you and the Volvo World. Enjoy coffee or lunch and admire the wonderful architecture or take a trip down Volvos history in the interactive exhibition. (Opens on April 14 2024).

Getting around in Gothenburg is easy, and accessible
The public transport system in Gothenburg is vast, and you can choose to use one of the distinctive trams, a bus or even a ferry. Buy a day ticket and explore the city without limits. All tickets and travel cards can be purchased at any of the public transport operator *Västtrafik*'s sales outlets or in the app *To Go*. If you only want a single ticket valid for 90 minutes, you can tap your debit card on board the transport. If you want to explore the city on two wheels instead, the bicycle-sharing system has more than 1,000 bicycles: vasttrafik.se/en.
